

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1- CASA VICTOR HUGO. PASAIA

Traditional house of Pasaia, Renaissance-styled and listed on the Spanish Register of Historical-Artistic Places. It conserves the original furniture from the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries, personal belongings of writer Victor Hugo, sculptures, drawings, photographs and different original objects. Among the rooms on the Museum are the "little room", the main room and the recreation of Victor Hugo's room.

5- MUSEO ETNOGRÁFICO DE ARTZINIEGA. ARTZINIEGA

Museum founded by the Artea Ethnographic Association in 1984. The collection of traditional articles is exhibited on the 21 rooms of the main building, the annexed building and the amphitheater area, with over 2200 square meters altogether. The setting and everyday life of the people who once inhabited the area have been recreated, down to the last detail. The tour includes rooms dedicated to different aspects of private life, various crafts, education, religiosity, etc.

2- BARCO MUSEO MATER. LA BONITERA VASCA TRADICIONAL. PASAIA

This Museum-ship is a traditional tuna fishing-boat, built in wood, turned into a floating museum specialized in traditional local fishing, where life on board is shown and where several workshops dedicated to fishing techniques take place, both for children and adults. The secrets to the Basque maritime heritage are revealed in the visit to the MATER Museum-ship: environmentally-friendly fishing techniques, the unique fisherman's life, the ship's peculiarities,...

6- TORRE-PALACIO DE LOS VARONA. VALDEGOVIA

The recently restored Palace-Tower of the Varona family is a medieval complex from the thirteenth and fourteenth centuries (the Tower) and from the fifteenth century (the Palace). The Palace conserves the French and Spanish mural wallpapers from the seventeenth, eighteenth and nineteenth centuries, which replaced the original tapestries. The meeting room and the refectory room, both in the Tower, can be visited. A library with interesting documents related to the Varona family is also available.

3- MUSEO IGNACIO ZULOAGA. ZUMAIA

Old chapel and hostelry in the Camino de Santiago (route of pilgrimage to Santiago), located in a group of monuments at the mouth of river Urola. It was acquired by painter Ignacio Zuloaga to set up his studio and the art collection he was gathering. It is an intimate and personal space in which his art works establish a dialogue with pieces ranging from ancient times to his contemporaries.

7- MUSEO ETNOGRÁFICO DE PIPAÓN. PIPAÓN, LAGRÁN

The Ethnographic Museum is located in a traditional house in Pipaon, and it's dedicated to the traditional life in the villages on the mountains of Alava, between the late nineteenth century and the early twentieth century. It exhibits tools, implements and traditional costumes, which recreate the domestic life, the crafts, the local history and customs, the games, celebrations and rites.

4- CASERÍO MUSEO IGARTUBEITI. EZKIO-ITSASO

Basque country house built in 1540 in the typical style used by local farmers, and enlarged in the seventeenth century. It conserves the original wooden structure as well as the original layout for living quarters, cattle, storage and cider production. The house was inhabited until 1990, and many of its articles were added to the museum, such as kitchenware, farming implements and some of the furnishings.
